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## What is the Resident Care Fund?

On Friday, November 8, friends, donors, volunteers, and staff of Gianna Homes gathered for an Italian Feast and evening filled with art and music. This annual fundraising event focused on gratitude for moments in our lives and how Gianna Homes residents retain abilities throughout their journeys with their diagnoses.

Nothing demonstrates the residents' abilities more adequately than the artwork done with the help of Mneme Therapist Suzy Volden. Art with Suzy allows residents to make beautiful paintings with simple back-and-forth brushstrokes. These gentle movements are theoried to help increase brain connectivity as well as create a rewarding experience for the resident. Paintings by the residents were sold at the event's auction and the images were used on note cards and jewelry pieces.

Event guests were invited to reflect on what brought them a sense of gratitude

and to write their thankful thoughts on olive leaves used to form a collage to be displayed at Gianna Homes.

The evening continued with story sharing and lessons learned from Gianna Homes residents: Board Member Skip Orlady shared his wife Liz's journey; Resident Gladys was honored by her grandson Blake DeRosier; Volunteer Francis Tangney spoke of his relationship with Don, a resident who showed him how to appreciate and live in the moment; and staff member Veronica Wanchena talked about humility gained in helping a resident participate in the feast.

Special music by the string trio Bell'Arco Chamber Players and vocalists Nicholas Chalmers and Bergen Baker, accompanied by James Barnett on the piano concluded the event.

The proceeds from this event will be used in the Gianna Homes' Resident Care Fund.



We started the year with the demands of funding and completing the new kitchen project. The task,




#### Gladys' Place

## LIZZY'S STORY

Liz was born and raised in Hutchinson, Minnesota. She had a wonderful life growing up in a small town as the youngest of four children. Her love of animals was fostered by her pet lamb, ducks, dogs and her beloved horse Sandy. Summers were spent at the family cabin on Green Lake in Spicer. She developed lifelong friends at "the Lake," where she was a lifeguard and taught swimming to area youth. Because of her love of water and swimming, Liz joined the Hutchinson High School boys swim team and was one of the first females in the state to participate on a boy's team.

Liz attended Gustavus Adolphus College, starting as a nursing student and graduating with a pre-med degree. She completed medical school at the University of Minnesota and went on to do a pediatric residency at the University of Pennsylvania. It was during this time that I met Liz. We had a long-distance relationship until she moved back for her final year of residency and to continue our relationship. We settled in South Minneapolis and had two children, Will and Grace. Life was good with beautiful children, nice careers and a full life ahead to enjoy it all.

Fast forward to May 2005. Liz came home from a day at work and informed me I was to attend a meeting with her and a few of her partners at her clinic. A situation was brought forward about Liz by nurses at a local hospital. This was the start of what led to a diagnosis of young onset Alzheimer's disease.

Over the next six years, Liz lived a very full life in our home. We were blessed with family, friends and financial resources to allow this, despite the disease. Like others caring for someone afflicted by this disease, the sun set on my ability to care for Liz approached. I was in crisis mode working full-time and Liz's care needs went beyond what friends and family could provide.

Liz entered Gianna Homes in April 2011 and was immediately embraced by staff and residents. On that first day, Claire played a Beatles song and a smile came across Liz's face. Not soon after, Liz's mom passed away. Anne Marie felt it was important that Liz attend her mother's funeral. I was not able to take her, but Anne Marie drove her to and from the funeral—150 miles—and sat with Liz. I looked across the church during the service knowing Liz was now in a place that would protect her and allow her to live life to the fullest.

Liz spent her last year of life at Gianna. My many beautiful memories of that time are a result of the model of care at Gianna. The most telling, however, was when Liz faced changes that would have had her removed from most other care facilities in our community. Anne Marie and the staff stuck with us as a family in need, and that is what I will carry with me over time.

- 9. Sylvester hosts his relatives for a family holiday gathering.



Many of you knew the vibrant, loving and generous Gladys, who was wife, mother, sister, neighbor and friend. A few years ago, when her family brought Gladys to live at Gianna Homes, she was fairly advanced on her journey with memory loss. Bob, Tina, Chris and Cheryl—all of whom had been caring for her for many years—shared insights about Gladys' likes and dislikes, and her spunky way of dealing with the world around her. As she adjusted to her new home, she quickly stole our hearts with her beautiful smile and glowing eyes.

In the years that Gladys lived with us, her family befriended residents and their families. Everyone who entered our doors—be it visitor or volunteer—was touched by their generosity of spirit. Bob used to joke that he was one of our staff and often wondered aloud when he would get on the payroll. Seriously though, he always jumped in to help wherever he was needed. The staff truly miss his daily presence, much of which was spent coaxing his dear Gladys to eat.

In her final days, a certain luminosity emanated from Gladys' face. A woman quick to meet the needs of others, a mother who raised loving children, and a wife who 'glowed with love' whenever she heard Bob's voice, shined with pure joy and love as she peacefully and ever so gently passed from this world to the next on November 13, 2013.

One would think that this outpouring of kindness would be legacy enough. But if you know the Kauffman family, they like to exceed expectations. Like Gladys, her family has a passionate commitment to make this world a better place for others, which led them to benevolently assist us in opening a second home for those suffering from memory loss. Gladys' Place, named in her honor, will live on as a testament of what unselfish love and generosity can do for the world around us. It seems to me there are those who come into this world and sprinkle so much angel dust that they leave it a far better place. As Bob said to me after Gladys had passed, "she now has her angel wings," and I couldn't agree more.

It was Christmas Eve and I was sitting with Mabel on the couch listening to Christmas music and enjoying the lights on the Christmas tree. As we looked at the various ornaments and commented on them, she pointed to one in particular and said with a big smile, "Mine." I looked to where she pointed and there, resting perfectly on one of the branches, were her dentures. I do believe she was very proud of her contribution.
